Being a In-car Driving Instructor in a Driving School

What is a in-car driving instructor's job at a driving school?

In-car driving instructor teach the 15 in-car sessions of the SAAQ Road Safety Education Program to driving school students. Each session helps students make progress towards acquiring the competencies targeted by the driving course.

All of the sessions are documented, so in-car driving instructor can follow the steps planned for each one. Teaching takes places in the vehicle with one student at a time (except for Sessions 12 and 13, which are with an observer). Sessions last 55 minutes.

What is a in-car instructor's basic profile?

Before committing to becoming a in-car driving instructor, candidates must have the following characteristics:

- Want to be a model driver in terms of knowledge, attitude and behaviour behind the wheel.
- Have good interpersonal communication skills (know how to listen and give clear explanations).
- Be interested in teaching a variety of different people how to drive.
- Have people skills and leadership.
- Know how to adapt and be a good communicator.

What kind of hours does a driving school in-car driving instructor work?

In-car Driving Instructors' schedules vary and depend largely on which school they work for. Since the majority of the clientele are young people age 16 to 19 who are still in school, in-car driving instructors often work from around 4 p.m. to late in the evening. In-car driving instructors also work on weekends because the students are often available then. Some in-car driving instructors have more than one job and are only available to the driving school on a part-time basis.

The number of hours that make up the work week may also vary depending on the number of students registered at the school.



What are the pre-requisites for a driving school in-car driving instructor?

- Be sponsored by a recognized driving school.
- Have held a valid Class 5 driver's licence for at least 2 years.
- Have a high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Not have more than 4 demerit points on their driving record in the last 2 years. Their driving record has to be submitted to the AQTr.
- Have a good driving record.

What kind of training is required for driving school in-car driving instructors?

Driving schools who sponsor candidates' training are required to enrol them in the RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program, which helps provide the skills to become a competent in-car driving instructor. Once they pass the training, candidates receive a competency card issued by the AQTr. Then driving schools can use their services as in-car driving instructor.

How is the training program structured?

The training program alternates classroom theory, and in-car practice with a in-car driving instructor-tutor (coach). This way, during the week in-car driving instructor can practise in a car what they learned in class, which makes learning easier.

The accompanying in-car driving instructor (coach) supervises the candidate during the training program and together they set up a calendar of supervision activities at the driving school so that the candidates can complete the training program.

How long is the training program?

Candidates can complete the training program within a minimum five-week period, or in a maximum of three months. Driving schools themselves will determine if candidates are ready and if they have all the required knowledge to be evaluated by the AQTr during the last step of the training program. When candidates pass the theoretical and practical evaluations, they obtain their in-car driving instructor card and can be employees and teach in-car sessions unsupervised at a recognized driving school.



Once in-car driving instructors are certified at the driving school, what kind of career prospects do they have?

In-car driving instructor can work in driving schools throughout the province of Quebec accredited by the AQTr. To become in-class instructor, a in-car driving instructor must have worked as a recognized in-car driving instructor for at least 11 months from the date of the final evaluation in the school in order to enrol in the RSE In-class Instructor Training Program.

An applicant who has a college diploma or higher level of education may undergo the RSE In-class Instructor Training Program by first completing in-car driving instructor training and having accumulated at least 600 work hours as a recognized in-car driving instructor.

In-class instructors teach the theory (modules) of the SAAQ driving course. A in-car driving/in-class instructor card is issued to candidates who perform both functions.


Goals of the RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program

The goals of this training program take into account the orientations of the *Road Safety Education Program*, the aim of which is to encourage learner drivers to exercise safe, cooperative and responsible behaviour.


- Encourage prospective in-car driving instructor to adopt the profile of a safe, cooperative and responsible driver.
- Ensure that prospective in-car driving instructors have the skills to teach learners all of the in-car sessions in the *Road Safety Education Program* and the ideas set out in the *RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program*.
- Initiate prospective in-car driving instructors into the trade and all of the techniques, teaching methods and pedagogical tools in the RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program.
- Equip prospective in-car driving instructors so that they can adapt their teaching to learners' characteristics and needs.
- Encourage prospective in-car driving instructors' progress and increased understanding of the knowledge necessary to teaching the Road Safety Education Program.

At the end of the training program, prospective in-car driving instructors should have mastered the knowledge necessary to teach learner drivers all of the in-car sessions in the *Road Safety Education Program*. They will also be able to guide learners towards enough independence so that they can safely, cooperatively and responsibly drive a passenger vehicle on the road network.

*Interchanging the order of the observations of theoretical modules is allowed.

**The order of in-car sessions for supervised teaching can be interchanged. Supervised teaching requires a minimum of 50 hours, including at least one session for each in-car session (1 to 15). The other sessions can be adapted to the candidate's needs.

These independent learning periods are required between each step.

To Pass the Program

To obtain a driving in-car driving instructor card, and thus be accredited to teach all of the in-car sessions to learner drivers without supervision, you need a passing mark of at least 75% on each of the following tests:

- First knowledge test
- Second knowledge test
- Summative road test given by the AQTr

Independent learning period – first knowledge test

This period of independent learning is to review general knowledge of driving a passenger vehicle. The 90-minute test has multiple-choice and short-answer questions. It deals with some sections of the *Road Access Binder* as well as the guides entitled *Driving a Passenger Vehicle* and *Driver's Handbook*. The test also covers all of *Accompanying Rider's Guide*. To find out which sections to study in these guides, refer to *Guide to Preparing for the First Knowledge Test*.

Second knowledge test

This theoretical test is used to check your knowledge and comprehension of all the content in the *RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program*. The 90-minute test has multiple-choice and short-answer questions. To prepare properly, read all of the content for Courses 1, 2 and 3 of the *RSE In-car Driving Instructor Training Program* as well as *Detailed Breakdown of Manoeuvres*.

Summative road test given by the AQTr

This practical evaluation is used to check if you have acquired enough skills to teach all of the in-car sessions in the *Road Safety Education Program* without supervision.

It is a road test. A representative of the driving school, seated in the back, will evaluate your work as a in-car driving instructor with a learner driver. The representative from the AQTr or a driving school employee cannot play the role of learner driver because they want to evaluate your skills in a real-life situation.

This 60-minute evaluation will assess how you teach an in-car session and will be followed by a 15-minute debriefing by the counsellor evaluator from the AQTr.

Guide to Preparing for the Knowledge Tests

At the end of the training session, you have to pass two knowledge tests.

To properly prepare for the test, read the *Road Access Binder*, *Driving a Passenger Vehicle*, *Driver's Handbook* and *Accompanying Rider's Guide*. In particular, you need to learn traffic rules, signs and signals, as well as the various characteristics of other road users and how to act appropriately around them. The table below lists the sections to study in each of the guides.
